

1 Register to vote

If you're not registered, get started at Vote.US to begin the process. If you are already registered, check your registration status and confirm your voter information is up-to-date and accurate to avoid any hiccups on Election Day.

2 Absentee and early voting

2020 is a unique year for voting procedures and several states are establishing absentee voting protocols to protect voters and the community. Even if you won't be traveling, it's a good idea to check the availability and requirements for using an absentee ballot.

3 Research Candidates

Study the issues, research candidates and their platforms, and find out what to look for in a debate. The information is out there. An informed vote is a powerful vote.

4 Go to the right place

It may sound obvious, but polling locations change. We recommend that once you've located your polling station, you familiarize yourself with the parking situation, hours of operation, and double-check it the day-of before you go to vote.

5 Election Day

Plan to get to the polls early and confirm requirements ahead of time. Check Vote.US, or your state election office to find out what you need to bring with you. If ID is needed, make sure the information on your voter registration matches your ID by the election.

MAKE SURE YOUR VOTE IS COUNTED!

Don't panic if you're registered but arrive at the polling station to find you're not on the list. Get help from a poll worker. Get directions if you are listed at a different polling station. You have the right to cast a provisional ballot so your state can iron out any discrepancies.
